Immigration Reform gets big jolt in Senate

Draft bill faces hurdles but offers a new hope to millions of immigrants

WASHINGTON — Senators from both parties announced a deal Thursday on a comprehensive immigration bill that would offer legal status to most of the 12 million undocumented immigrants while also toughening border security.

If the bill becomes law, it would result in the biggest changes in immigration law and policy in more than 20 years.

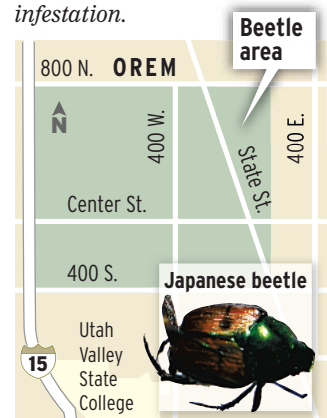

That would provide President Bush with a political lift and a tangible accomplishment for his second term. It also would be a solid achievement for the new Democratic leaders in Congress, though they said they would seek changes in the measure.

Bugged out: Orem spraying ordered

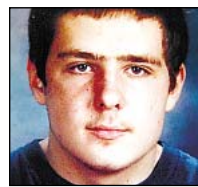
OREM — About 2,300 people living in a 10 square-block area of Orem are getting letters from state officials telling them their lawns, gardens and trees will be sprayed to eradicate an infestation of destructive Japanese beetles.

On Thursday, the Utah Department of Agriculture and Food declared an emergency, giving the state authority to treat all property within 800 North, State Street, 400 South

Trolley Square indictments

HOW TALOVIC GOT THE GUNS



The handgun used in the Trolley Square killings resided peaceably in a Wyoming home until last year, when it disappeared from its owner's gun safe, exchanged hands numerous times and was sold to Sulejman Talovic at a McDonald's restaurant in Salt Lake City. The shotgun that he used to commit most of the carnage was sold to him illegally at a West Valley City pawn shop, according to federal indictments unsealed Thursday. **See story, A8**

The victims » Families who lost loved ones at Trolley Square welcome the weapons prosecutions. "People need to take responsibility," said Stephen Hinckley, father of 15-year-old victim Kirsten Hinckley. But they agree: "It's Talovic who deserves the blame," said Richard Quinn, husband of victim Vanessa Quinn. "He is the one who walked into the mall and used the weapons." **See story, A9**

The path of the guns » Here is how Talovic acquired the guns, according to federal prosecutors.

- 1 In Rock Springs, Wyo.,** teenager Kolby Darlington gave a Smith & Wesson .38 Special to Mackenzie Glade Hunter in June 2006.
- 2 Hunter, barred from having guns** because he was a drug user, illegally owned the handgun in Utah between early June and July 2006.
- 3 At a Salt Lake City-area restaurant** between June 16 and July 28, 2006, Hunter and Brenden Taylor Brown illegally sold the gun to Talovic, then 17.
- 4 Firearms dealer** Westley Wayne Hill sold a pistol grip shotgun — limited to buyers age 21 and older — to Talovic, 17, on Nov. 13, 2006.

The players » According to federal prosecutors, at least five people helped Talovic get the guns. **See story, A8**

Kolby Darlington, 19: Gave dad's pistol to Hunter. No charges.

Mackenzie Glade Hunter, 19: Sold handgun to Talovic; possessed firearm while a drug user.



Brenden Taylor Brown, 20: Illegally sold pistol to Talovic; lied to police.



Matthew Hautala, 20: Lied to police about gun and drug deals.

Westley Wayne Hill, 38: Sold shotgun illegally; did not properly fill out papers.

Model: Mayerick Arms, Model 88, 12-gauge
Cost: \$200 (with shoulder butt). Pistol grip conversion is extra.

Who's it for?
The weapon is designed for personal security.

Model: .38 Special Smith & Wesson, Model 36
Cost: \$450 (varies)

Who's it for?
.38 Specials were once routinely issued to police officers.

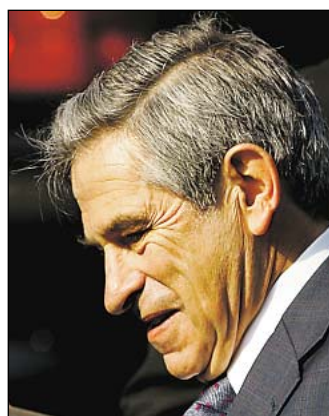
